WATERING INSTRUCTIONS

Cooler temperatures combined with the shorter days this time of year greatly reduced water requirements for grass. Therefore we recommend shutting off irrigation systems **now until next spring**. Allowing the system to continue to run through the winter is unnecessary and increases the likelihood of disease activity.



What we are doing this month and why.

This month we will continue applying our fall/winter season fertilizer formula which contains potassium. Potassium encourages the grass to store carbohydrates in its root system. This stored energy will be used next spring when it comes out of dormancy. We are also continuing to apply pre-emergent weed control to suppress weeds. We will apply pre-emergent weed control throughout the year to keep constant pressure on weed populations. We are also applying post emergent weed control to control actively growing weeds.

Mole crickets are the only turf destroying insect that remains active through the winter. However, the colder it gets the less active they become. We will, treat them as needed. Disease is most active between 70° and 80°. We are fluctuating back and forth around that temperature window so we will keep a close eye out for disease activity and apply fungicide as needed when we notice disease activity occurring.

HOW SHOULD I REPAIR IT?
I was recently asked this question from a Facebook follower. Here is my answer:

Replacing it with new sod would probably be the best solution. You won't be able to get the grass to recover while it's being worn down by the dogs. Bermuda has the best ware tolerance of any grass but it doesn't tolerate any shade. If you have shade, zoysia is the next

best option. Once the new grass is established, you'll want to fertilize it about once a month during the growing season to help it continually recover from the ware from the dogs. If you can, when you install the new sod, do 1/2 of the yard at a time. Section off half the area to install the new sod and keep the dogs off it until it gets rooted in. Then do the same for the other section.

WHAT SHOULD YOU DO ABOUT MUSHROOMS **GROWING IN YOUR LAWN?**

Mushrooms grow off of decomposing roots and stumps under the ground and pop up when moisture and temperature conditions are conducive for the spores to grow (usually cool, wet spring and fall weather). They don't harm the grass and there is no product they make to treat them with. Once the weather turns cold or warms up, depending on the season, they will go away. In the mean

time the only other option is to pluck them.

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
